The meaning of the Liturgy

While the liturgy we use in the Episcopal Church may seem confusing to those who are new to it, what we do is rich in meaning, an understanding the stories and meaning behind what we do helps to enrich your worship experience. If you think of certain parts of the liturgy as essentially a dramatic representation of a truth- adding another dimension to our words- it can be helpful. Lent and Holy Week have rich and ancient traditions that inform the liturgies we use for the services.

In the Early Church we didn't have the seasons of the Church Year. There was only the celebration of the weekly Sunday Eucharist or Mass and the yearly celebration of Holy Week and Easter. There was no

Christmas Day, no Saints Days, no seasons of Pentecost or Advent. Much of what we know of the Early Church's observance of Holy Week comes to us through the diary of a woman named Egeria. She was a woman of noble birth who made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem during Easter in the Fourth Century. She kept a detailed travel journal which has survived to this day. In it, she recorded what she saw the Christian Community doing to liturgically proclaim the events and wonders of Holy Week. It is clear from what she tells us that when she saw these things in the fourth century, they were already considered very old practices.

The liturgies of Holy Week invite us to experience Holy Week in three ways. 1. They invite us to a sharing of actual historical events connected with the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Our Lord. 2. They invite us to participate in those events by memory, re-enactment, and by application to contemporary circumstances. 3. They invite us to proclaim the reality of the Risen Lord who is alive today.

While the Early Church lacked much of the Church structure and sacred history and texts that we enjoy and take for granted today, they did have Jerusalem. This was the center of the Early Church and it was the city where Jesus had actually taught and preached and where he had been crucified and rose from the dead. The early Christians were consumed with a passionate desire to proclaim the Good News of the Resurrection in the here and now and believed they were living in the final days. The only audio-visual tools they had to illustrate their story was the "stage" of Jerusalem where the events had actually taken place. They were not trying to design a liturgy for the church to use in the ages to come; they were simply taking friends who visited Jerusalem to the places where the events occurred. They pointed out the places and told of the event that had happened. It was natural for believers to offer prayer at these sites. Eventually, set forms emerged for telling the story and recalling it with prayer.

The Liturgies of Holy Week date back to the first celebration of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday with Jesus and the disciples. The word "maundy" comes from the same root word as "mandate" and means "to command". It is taken from the statement of Jesus that night, "A new commandment I give to you: That you love one another as I have loved you". They continue with the way of the cross walked by Jesus on Good Friday and the few followers who followed him through the crowds on the road to the cross, and on Easter morning when the followers of Jesus began moving about the city with the news that He had risen. Tellings and proclaiming the story IS the liturgy.

Originally, Lent (which means "Spring") was observed only during Holy Week beginning with Palm Sunday and the dramatic reenactment of the triumphal entry into Jerusalem. It was later lengthened to forty days in honor of the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness. The Palm Sunday Liturgy is probably very close to the way the first Christians acted out the story of the Crucifixion in order to tell it to those who were converting to or enquiring about the Faith.

While most of us do not have the luxury of being able to make a pilgrimage to experience Holy Week in Jerusalem and actually walk where Jesus walked and see what he saw, we can make our own pilgrimage right here by reenacting the events through the Liturgies of Holy Week. It is a powerful faith experience to make a point of going to the services beginning with Palm Sunday, then Maundy Thursday, one of the Good Friday services, and Easter Sunday and heighten your understanding of what it is to be a disciple of Jesus by experiencing that last climactic week of his life and ministry through the liturgies of the week. These services can also be a powerful teaching tool for children when you are helping them understand the story. (On Palm Sunday they go up to Church School for a portion of the service where they will be learning the same story using a curriculum that fits their age.) I encourage you to fully participate in the Lent and Holy Week experience at St. Peter's this year and experience the journey with Jesus.

Children start out worshipping with their families and then proceed to classes with the teachers. Spiritual Adult Ed Programs

Morning Bible Study continues to meet on Tuesday at 7:00 a.m. in the church library.

Women's Bible Study continues to meet on Tuesday mornings from 9:30 – 11:00 a.m. and is doing a Beth Moore study on 1 & 2 Thessalonians, called "Children of the Day". **This Bible study will break during Lent and resume after Easter.**

True Spirituality is part of the *Living on the Edge* series by Chip Ingram. This study meets on Wednesday evenings 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m., beginning with dinner. This powerful study removes the clutter and presents a clear, compelling, Biblical picture of a true disciple of Jesus. The teaching is a 25-minute video followed by an hour of discussion informed by scripture. **True Spirituality is on break during the month of March for Lent and will resume in April.**

Alpha classes are held Thursday evenings 6:30 p.m. - 8:30 p.m., beginning with dinner. This 15 week course is designed to walk people through the basics of the faith in a way that works for those new to the faith and enriches the faith of those who have been going to church all their lives. Small groups are being formed and you are welcome to form your own. The leadership is provided by the study guide and the video that is shown for each session. Online Christian Education Resource: We have signed up for a three-month trial period with "Right Now Media". This is a wonderful resource for bible studies, teachings on topics addressing all different areas of life, Christian conferences, and wonderful Christian children's programming. We will be giving them emails of parishioners to invite to have free access to the church's account. If you are interested, please call the office to let us know, so we are sure you are included. Please take advantage of this right away, and let us know if you will be using it, so we know if it is something we want to continue.

How to Invest in the Fellowship of Your Church

“When God’s people are in need, be ready to help them. Always be eager to practice hospitality.” (Romans 12:13 NLT, second edition)

God wants us to use some of our money to encourage fellowship, to show love to other believers, and to build relationships.

Any time I give my money to God, it draws me closer to God. Any time I give my money to

another person, it draws me closer to that person. When I give money to people in my small group or I invest in my small group, I grow closer to those in the group.

Any time I go out and buy a nice card and write a note of encouragement, I’ve just invested in God’s Mutual Fund. When another believer is discouraged and needs somebody to talk to and I buy him or her lunch, I’ve just invested in God’s Mutual Fund.

The Bible says, *“When you extend hospitality to Christian brothers and sisters, even when they are strangers, you make the faith visible”* (3 John 1:5 MSG). When we invest our money in developing relationships within the Church, it points others to God. In other words, when you invest in the fellowship of your church, it helps bring people to Christ.

Be creative! Be innovative! Put some thought into it. *“Let’s see how inventive we can be in encouraging love and helping out”* (Hebrews 10:24).

Any time you give to other believers, it draws you closer to them!

Talk It Over

- Where do you see a need in your small group or with a family in your church?
- What are your fears related to reaching out to strangers to invest in their lives? Ask God for help to overcome your fears and trust him with your ministry.
- How do strong relationships within the Church help point people to God.
