March Forth

March is a month with challenges and blessings. Winter is supposed to end on March 21st, and spring to begin. Because Easter is April 16th, we have the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, on March 1st. (Please come to church for Holy Communion and the Imposition of Ashes at any of the following services: 7:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, and 7:30 p.m.)

I'd like to emphasize two saints' days in March. The first is St. David on March 1st. Unless you're Welsh, you may not know much about him. The second is March 17th, the more familiar St. Patrick. Each of these people had a dramatic impact on the Church and the world of their times.

St. David was the son of Non. She was a queen and an abbess who lived a remarkable life. She was an evangelist and church planter in Wales, England, and France. She had a special identification with the poor, and was anointed to pray with great success for the healing of the mentally ill. When she gave birth to David, it was always intended that he would serve the Lord in the Church. David went on to start many monasteries, and was elected Bishop of Menevia, where he had a strong ministry, especially upholding the apostolic faith. David is beloved by the people of Wales. He is the patron saint of that country.

St. Patrick, though claimed by the Irish as their patron saint, whose day is March 17th, was born in Britain. He was the son and grandson of prominent clergy. And, as the Roman Empire became unstable in Britain, he was kidnapped by Irish raiders, and brought to Ireland as a slave. He saw his nation's and his own calamity as the consequences of unbelief and, in repentance, turned to Christ, whom he worshipped as he tended sheep for five years. He had a vision, which he followed, that led to his escape and return to Britain. Later in his life, he sensed the call to return to Ireland, as his captors appeared to him in a dream and begged him to come and share his faith with them and their country. Patrick travelled throughout Ireland, starting monasteries, ordaining clergy, spending his entire adult life loving and serving the people who were once his enemies.

The Christian movement in Ireland and Wales has been strong, although with many challenges, for over fifteen centuries.

I will close with the Collect for St. Patrick:

"Almighty God, in your providence you chose your servant Patrick to be the apostle of the Irish people, to bring those who were wandering in darkness and error to the true light and knowledge of you: Grant us so to walk in that light, that we may come at last to the light of everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever. Amen."

As we remember these two saints for the month of March, let us be purposeful to march forth in the light of Christ, and to bring others with us.

A trained special education/elementary education teacher, Amanda Sayers, and an assistant caregiver, who has participated in Red Cross and Safe Church training, provide care for the children in the nursery on the second floor of the education building. An usher will be happy to assist you in locating this room. Our Church School program meets during the 10:00 a.m. service for children ages 3-12. The children will be led to class by their teachers and returned in time for communion. Visitors are encouraged to have their children participate

Parenting in the Pew

When our four children were young, it was a challenge to be the only adult in the pew with them! Some days, the frustrations of getting them all ready on time, and then the struggle to help them “behave” were overwhelming. Robbie Castleman, in her book *Parenting in the Pew*, helped me. Where I had been fretting about what I was getting (or not getting) out of worship, she asked, “What does God get out of worship?”

Here are some ideas:

- Jesus said, “Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them.” We train our children for many things; we can also *train* them to worship. We don’t just “go to church”; we “go to worship”.
- Sunday morning starts Saturday night – plan and prepare as you would for any other celebration!
 - Open the emailed bulletin – read the appointed Scriptures – scan the announcements – will there be something special, like a baptism?
 - Talk about Sunday worship ahead of time
 - Get clothes ready beforehand
 - Set aside money for the offering (teach them about giving to God and His work); select food items to donate
 - Keep breakfast simple
 - Prepare your own heart
- Minimize distractions: Leave toys/screens at home; have children sit with family for the service, and hang out with friends later.
- Stay physically close, even hold younger children, so they can see, and so you can whisper instructions and explanations.
- Share books; encourage children to pray/sing/read along; even younger ones can sing “la la la” to the tune when they can’t read.
- Teach them about Holy Communion. There we remember that Jesus died for us, and we receive Him, and say “yes” to Him. It’s a reverent time, and it’s also joyous, because God just loves it when we come to Him and say “yes” to Him!

If you’d like to introduce changes, do it steadily and kindly but firmly. Kids may grumble, and it will take some work, but soon everyone will adjust.

For the rest of us, let’s remember that when we come together as the body of Christ, worship is not about “Jesus and me”; it’s about “Jesus and *we*”. Children can enhance the worship of God for the whole congregation. They are willing to believe, and their hearts have a great capacity for worship. So pray for our families, and smile (don’t glare) at a parent who is struggling with a child in the pew.

Children aren’t “the future of the Church”; they are “the present of the Church”!

Let’s Make Life Easier!

Let’s continue wearing our nametags. This will be good practice for when our new Rector arrives.

Lenten Evening Prayer Begins March 2

Looking for a quiet, meditative service that will bring you closer to the Lord during this Lenten season? You can find personal and spiritual solace while bringing yourself closer to the true meaning of Lent and Easter by attending Evening Prayer in St. Peter’s Chapel at 6:00 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays during Lent.

The short service, led by several of the parish’s Lay Eucharistic Ministers and fellow parishioners, begins on Thursday, March 2 and will conclude with a service on Tuesday, April 11 during Holy Week.

Each service runs about a half hour and offers a meditative way to “let go” of the day’s burdens and frustrations while also celebrating the day’s joys. You do not have to attend each service, although that could be a beneficial Lenten discipline.

The service will offer Rite I from the Book of Common Prayer.

For the Sundays during the season of Lent, our services will follow Rite I in the Book of Common Prayer. This will begin March 5 and continue through Sunday, April 2nd.

Juarez Mission Trip

Reason #2 for going on a mission trip (From J. Lee Grady)

You will expand your limited perspective. Too many of us are stuck in spiritual ruts. Even pastors can get bored with the sameness of ministry in one community. Every now and then you need to step out of your comfort zone and allow God to stretch you. Experience how other Christians worship God with fervor. Discover how they plant churches and engage in evangelism. Recognize that the way we do ministry in the United States is not necessarily the only way. And expect to learn from the people you are going to minister to.

Two years ago we went to Mexico during Holy Week. As usual we planned our extra day activity and on that Friday we proceeded to cross the border. On our way out of Colonia Anapra we witnessed something that we don't see here in the United States, the procession of the cross down the streets on Good Friday. Up until the moment we saw the cross, I don't think any of us remembered that it was Good Friday. But we were in a hurry to leave so ... This year again we will be in Mexico during Holy Week but instead of thinking about the customs and traditions we will be missing back home we have an opportunity to focus on the traditions and customs in Mexico. Open your hearts and minds to how others worship Christ; consider joining us, as we become the hands and feet of God.

St. Peter's will be hosting a *Safe Church Hybrid* Training session on Saturday morning, April 29, 2017.

Basic Safe Church Training is *required* of church employees AND volunteers who have contact with the youth and/or the elderly of the parish. This applies to *all* Church School teachers and assistants, Nursery care personnel and assistants, Youth group leaders and chaperones, Lay Ministers, and others who visit the ill and members in facilities like Carriage Green. It is for both those who have not yet attended a Safe Church Training in the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, or who took it *longer than 4 years ago*. Many of you took it in 2012 when a full-day training was held here at St. Peter's, but that certification has expired, so you will need to recertify.

The Topics include:

- Prevention, identification and response to elder abuse
- Prevention, identification and response to sexual abuse of children and youth
- The newly revised diocesan policy for the protection of children and youth
- Power and boundaries in the ministerial relationship with adults
- The diocesan response to misconduct within a community of faith
- Sexual harassment
- Guidelines for ordained ministry (many of which apply to lay ministry)

For those who need to take the training for the first time, or who need to be re-certified, there are two options for meeting the requirement for Certification. One option is an all day session. The other NEW option is called a **"hybrid" option**: it consists of an online training component PLUS a shortened live follow-up training on Saturday morning. The online component must be completed no later than 2 days prior to attending the live component. We at St. Peter's are hosting the live class part of the hybrid option on Saturday morning, April 29, 2017, from 9 a.m. to noon. This option for meeting the Safe Church requirements is a convenient alternative to the all-day sessions that many St. Peter's folk have taken in the past.

You will receive a link via email to the online modules after you register for the live training within a week after registering. For questions contact Debbie Kenney at dkenney@episcopalct.org. This is the better option for those with busy lives. Kathleen, our Parish administrator, completed the hybrid course last fall, and would be happy to talk further with you about it.

40 Days in the Word

The Bible Always Survives and Always Will

“Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away” (Matthew 24:35 NIV).

The Bible is the most despised, derided, denied, disputed, dissected, and debated book in all of history. This Bible has been under attack for centuries, for everything you can imagine.

Yet the Bible is still the most read, most published, and most translated book in the world. And, most importantly, it's still changing the lives of those who apply what it teaches.

One of the reasons I believe the Bible is God's Word is that it has survived so many attacks throughout history.

Despite all the attacks, today the Bible is the greatest single source of culture. It's the greatest single source for music, art, and architecture. If you take the Bible out of culture, you would destroy most of the major music, artwork, and architecture of the past 2,000 years. Even much of our English language comes from the King James Bible.

The Bible has flourished in spite of unrelenting attacks during the past 2,000 years. Jesus said in Matthew 24:35, *“Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away”* (NIV). The only item on the planet that will last is the Word of God. Everything else will burn up, because truth is eternal.

Voltaire, the famous French philosopher, was a brilliant atheist. He wrote a number of tracts deriding the Bible. He once made a very bold statement: “One hundred years from today the Bible will be a forgotten book.”

Today, everyone has forgotten that quote — not the Bible! After Voltaire died, for nearly 100 years, his homestead was used as the book depository for the French Bible Society. They sold Bibles out of his house! It's now a museum. People have forgotten Voltaire. Nobody forgets the Bible.

No matter what attacks come the Bible's way, it always survives — and it always will. You can depend on that.

Talk It Over

How has the Bible affected your life? What difference has it made in your life
 Does your perspective on life reflect the knowledge that this earth will one day pass away?
 How would your life change if you focused your life on the one thing that will never pass away?

Ask God for the courage to stand up to those who oppose God's Word with grace, gentleness, and wisdom.
